Code Enforcement Efforts

(Goal 13- Focus enforcement (including Neighborhood Preservation) activities on community priorities)

Illegal Signage

Over the weekend, Neighborhood Preservation (NP) staff conducted proactive field outreach at 33 open house events to monitor compliance with City signage standards. Staff observed a total of 56 real estate signs, the majority of which were in compliance. Three realtor signs were corrected on-site with the cooperation of the respective agents. Additionally, staff removed six non-compliant garage sale, campaign, and business signs. These efforts reflect NP's continued commitment to education, collaboration, and voluntary compliance in support of a clean, safe, and well-maintained community.

Keeping Livermore Clean

- To preserve the City's visual character and protect public health and safety, staff conduct proactive weekly code enforcement to identify and address violations promptly. Recent efforts include:
 - Property maintenance enforcement on Vancouver Way, and Altamont Creek Drive.
 - Removal of illegal dumping on Collier Canyon Road, Central Avenue, and Concannon Blvd.
 - Graffiti abatement on Altamont Creek Drive, Pacific Avenue, and Scenic Avenue,
 - Collection of abandoned shopping carts on First Street, Stanley Blvd, N. Livermore Avenue, and Holmes Street.

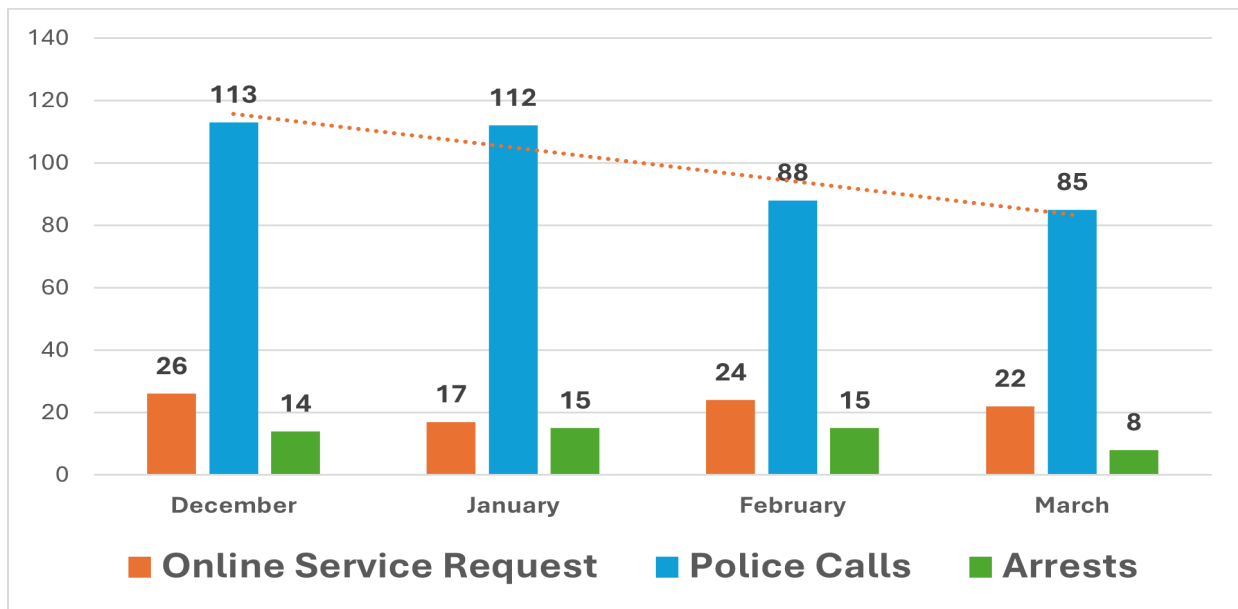

Measure W Advocacy

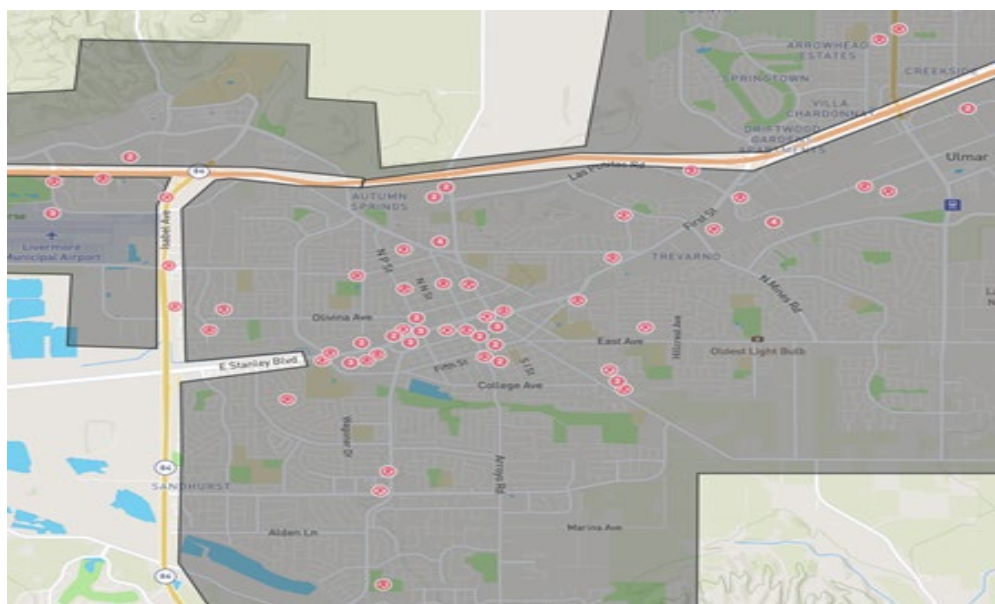
- The attached letter to the Alameda County Board of Supervisors expresses the City of Livermore's appreciation for regional collaboration on implementing Measure W and emphasizes the importance of a clear, consistent, and data-driven funding allocation process to ensure accountability and public trust. It strongly advocates for a Point-in-Time (PIT) count-based methodology, noting it is the most objective and widely accepted measure of homelessness and aligns funding with demonstrated need across jurisdictions, while supporting regional coordination and long-term planning.
- The letter, signed by the Mayor, was also sent to Homeless and Housing Services Director Jonathon Russell and Interim Health Director Aneeka Chaudhry.



Homeless Response and Encampment March 2026 Update



- In March, the City recorded 22 online service requests, 85 calls for service, and eight arrests related to homelessness. For reference, a three-month comparison includes 88 calls in February 2026, 112 in January 2026, 113 in December 2025, indicating a downward trend in reported homelessness-related activity.
- The majority of the unhoused were contacted multiple times and declined services.
- Geographically, the calls for service in March were largely focused on the center of the city, and Homeless Reporting Form submissions focused on the encampment adjacent to 580E/Portola Avenue.





- The Police Department’s Mobile Evaluation Team (MET) submitted Care Court petitions for two individuals, which were accepted by the court for hearings scheduled at the end of April for both individuals.
- Encampment notifications were received and Block-by-Block responded and completed cleanups at the following locations: the “rose garden” at First Street and Stanley Blvd., Concannon and Holmes, Lucky’s on Portola, downtown Safeway, and Stanley Blvd. and Murrieta Blvd.
- Human services staff met with the Public Works, homeless liaison officers, CityServe, and Block-by-Block to coordinate the next steps for an encampment cleanup at the property adjacent to Interstate 580 between the Portola Avenue and North Livermore Avenue exits. The following next steps in the action plan were developed:
 - The HLO Team and the CityServe will conduct two additional outreach efforts with the encampment population between April 7–21, 2026.
 - Human Services, Public Works, and Community Development staff identified clean-up service provider and logistics, and finalized the next steps in the encampment abatement process.
 - The goal is to remove the encampment by the end of April while addressing the needs of the unhoused population through connections to services and interim housing.

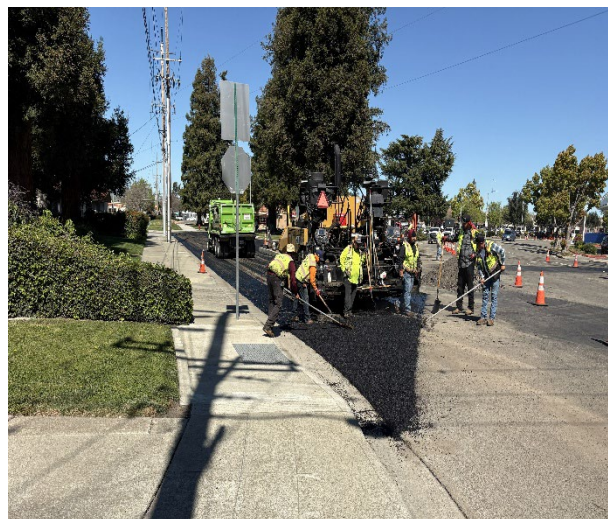
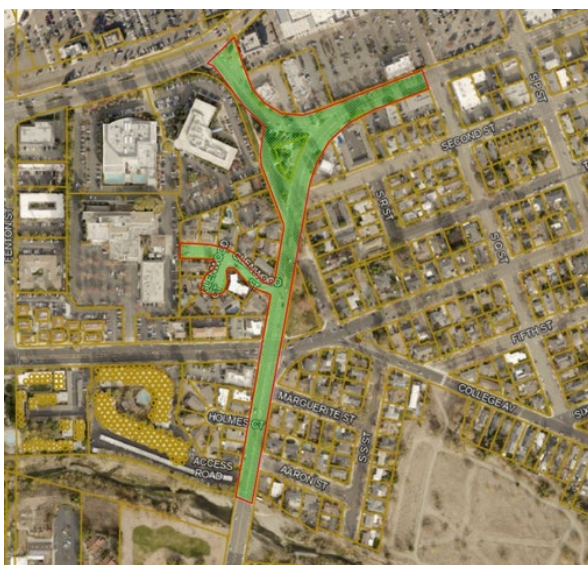
Contactor Pre-Qualification Process Initiated for Water Reclamation Plant Administration Building Repairs

- On April 14, 2026, the City issued a Request for Statements of Qualifications (RFQ) seeking contractors interested in becoming pre-qualified to bid on the Water Reclamation Plant (WRP) Occupied Building Repairs Project (No. WW202322).
- Following the completion of the RFQ process, bid documents are anticipated to be released in May 2026 to contractors who have been successfully pre-qualified.
- The project includes interior and exterior renovations to the Administration Building at the Water Reclamation Plant. Planned improvements include upgrades and replacement of mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and low-voltage/data systems; commissioning of building systems; and enhancements to meet ADA accessibility standards.

Annual Sewer Replacement (Holmes Street)

- The contractor is completing restoration work through May 8, 2026 (see image below for project limits).
- Type II micro surfacing, a preventative pavement treatment used to extend the life of the road, is scheduled for April 22–23, weather permitting.
- Striping will follow approximately one week later, currently expected to occur between May 1 – May 8, 2026. As part of this phase, the City is coordinating with the contractor to update pavement markings to include new bike lanes in this area in alignment with the Active Transportation Plan (ATP).
- Lane closures will occur in both directions on Holmes, Fourth, South S, Aaron Marguerite, and First Streets throughout April and May.

Cal Water Main Replacement on South Livermore Avenue

- California Water Service (Cal Water) has completed installation of a new water main along South Livermore Avenue between Second Street and Eighth Street.
- Slurry seal and roadway striping are anticipated to begin in mid-June, to minimize disruptions to school related traffic.
- As part of the final improvements, the City is coordinating with Cal Water to update pavement markings to include a dedicated bike lane along this corridor, consistent with the City's Active Transportation Plan (ATP).
- Motorists should expect:
 - Intermittent road and lane closures.
 - Detours on South Livermore Avenue and nearby streets.
 - The Livermore Avenue and East Avenue/Fourth Street intersection will experience the most significant impacts during construction.



- Advance notification being provided to commuters via message boards with dates of work and recommendation to use alternative routes.

CalWater Railroad Avenue Mainline Replacement

- Cal Water has completed installation of the mainline and service lines along Railroad Avenue between P Street and South S Street. Upcoming work will include final surface restoration.
 - Grinding and paving: April 22–24, 2026
 - Slurry seal and striping: April 27, 2026
- Traffic Impacts:
 - Variable lane closures, road closures, and detours in both directions of Railroad Avenue with the Railroad Ave / P Street intersection significantly impacted during this work.
 - Advance notification is being provided to commuters via message boards that include dates of work and recommendation to use alternative routes.

Downtown

L-Street Garage Project

The L-Street Garage is currently open to the public, and the contractor continues to work on punch list items as noted below:

- Main Entrance Marquee Sign - The installation of the Marquee Sign is complete.
- Informational Kiosks - The informational kiosks are now installed – contractor continues to work on the lighting.
- Construction Trailers and Site Cleanup - construction trailers and remaining construction fencing are expected to be removed by the end of next week. The contractor will be performing minor restoration (re-striping) of the affected area of the parking lot.

Police

Free Scam Awareness Presentation

On April 16, the Livermore Police Department’s Community Outreach Unit hosted a free Scam Awareness presentation at Cedar Grove Community Church. More than 100 community members attended. Officer Swanson provided valuable information on topics including situational awareness, email security, and artificial intelligence safety.





E-Bike Safety Presentation

- On April 15, the Livermore Police Department's School Resource Officer Unit met with nearly 600 students at East Avenue Middle School to discuss e-bike and scooter safety. Students learned rules of the road, where riding is permitted, helmet safety, and proper procedures at stop signs. SROs also distributed helmets to students in need.



Bataan Death March Memorial

- On April 11, the Livermore Police Department Honor Guard participated in the 84th Annual Bataan Death March Memorial at the San Francisco National Cemetery. The ceremony included a KC-135 flyover from the 452nd Air Mobility Wing at March Air Force Base and featured this year's theme, "Honoring Our WWII Nurses."

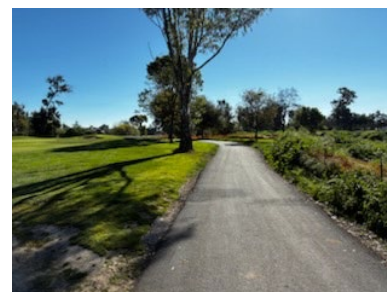

Las Positas Golf Course Damage Repair Project Update

- Construction of flood walls, the new golf cart path on the east side of the parking lot, and grading along the tee box and Beeb’s party area is complete.
- Site restoration is scheduled to be completed next week. Please note that this timeline may shift depending on ground conditions and moisture levels resulting from anticipated weather between Sunday and Wednesday.
- The project is currently waiting for the flood gate to be manufactured. It is anticipated to arrive on site in early June. Installation is expected to be complete within one week of arrival. Due to this delay, substantial completion of the overall project is now projected for mid- to late June.

2024 Storm Drain Trash Capture Project

- All trash capture devices have now been installed. The contractor is currently installing lids and manhole covers for City-provided structures that were previously delayed. Work is underway on Portola Avenue and will continue next on Southfront Road. Lid installation is anticipated to be completed by the end of next week.



- Substantial completion of the project is projected for mid-May.

Dear Board President David Haubert:

Thank you for convening the East County Regional Home Together meeting and for your continued leadership on the implementation of Measure W. The City of Livermore appreciates the opportunity to provide input on this critical funding framework and values our ongoing regional partnership.

Measure W represents a significant public investment, and its long-term success will depend on maintaining public trust, delivering measurable outcomes, and ensuring funds are distributed in a manner that is clear and consistent. As jurisdictions work collaboratively across the Tri-Valley, it is essential that the allocation methodology supports both regional coordination and local accountability.

For these reasons, the City of Livermore strongly supports a straight Point-in-Time (PIT) Count-based allocation methodology for distributing Measure W funds.

The PIT Count is the most objective, transparent, and widely accepted measure of homelessness across Alameda County. It provides a consistent, data-driven foundation that directly aligns funding with demonstrated need in each jurisdiction. The County's own Home Together framework relies on PIT data to inform system modeling, regional targets, and long-term planning, reinforcing its role as the appropriate baseline for resource allocation.

Livermore remains committed to working in partnership with Alameda County and Tri-Valley partners to advance the shared goals of the Home Together Plan. This includes maintaining existing capacity, expanding interim housing and shelter, investing in prevention, and scaling permanent housing solutions.

We strongly encourage the County to adopt a straightforward PIT-based allocation model that supports regional collaboration while ensuring accountability to each community. We look

forward to continued engagement through the City-County Technical Working Group and future regional convenings.
